

Eurospeak's <u>English for Specific Purposes: The Military Service</u> course is suitable for students interested in a career in the military. Eurospeak's **ESP The Military Service** gives students the language, information, and skills they will need for a career in the armed forces.

A highly communicative course, Eurospeak's **ESP The Military Service** meets the English language needs of military personnel on international operations, peacekeeping, humanitarian assistance and training exercises, providing students with the functional language they need for a variety of scenarios. It exposes students to an accurate and up-to-date reflection of military life and language. A practical, skills-based approach ensures learners are quickly operational in the target language with topics drawn from authentic international military contexts including NATO and the UN.

The course is available in three levels: A1, A2/B1 and B2+.

Eurospeak's ESP The Military Service comprises 120 hours of training (4 weeks) and allows students to:

- ✓ Improve their general English
- ✓ Learn the professional language they need to communicate effectively the military context.

On successful completion of the course, you will be awarded the Eurospeak ESP The Military Service certificate.

Course Components

Language Development (60 hours - morning sessions)

Learners study the English language in a variety contexts and learn to use English with greater fluency, accuracy and confidence.

Module Objectives

- ✓ Improve the trainees' knowledge and understanding of the English Language.
- ✓ Develop their own reading, writing, speaking and listening skills.
- ✓ Develop their ability to use English in a variety of contexts.
- ✓ Allow them to become more fluent and confident in their use of English.

Module Content

Depending on the trainees' level of English. A1 to B2 options available.

Proficiency Objectives:

- ✓ A1 Learners are able to use simple sentence patterns to talk about themselves and other people, deal with everyday situations with predictable content and produce brief everyday expressions about personal details and daily routines.
- ✓ A2 Learners are able to deal with everyday situations with predictable content, produce brief everyday expressions about personal details, daily routines, wants and needs, requests for information and use simple sentence patterns to talk about themselves and other people, what they do, places, possessions etc.
- ✓ B1 Learners are able to enter unprepared into conversation on familiar topics, express personal opinions and exchange information on topics that are familiar, of personal interest or pertinent to everyday life.
- ✓ B2 Learners are able to participate in standard interaction likely to be encountered in social, professional or academic life, identifying speakers' viewpoints and attitudes as well as the information content.





English for Specific Purposes (60 hours – afternoon sessions)

Learners study the language and strategies they need to communicate effectively in military contexts.

- ✓ Develop the vocabulary, language, and skills that students need to communicate effectively.
